**A NEW STATE.**—The people of Wisconsin are talking of organizing into a State, and asking admission into the Union at this session. The people seem to be almost unanimous in favor of the formation of a State Government, but are a great deal divided as to the best method of arriving at the end proposed. An effort, however, will be made to bring Wisconsin in simultaneously with Texas. [St. Louis Republican.]

The Constitution of Missouri provides that none but native-born citizens of the United States are eligible to the office of Governor. The Convention now in session at Jefferson city to amend it have adopted a proposition, by a vote of fifty to fifteen, that the Governor shall hereafter be thirty years of age, shall have been a citizen of the United States ten years, and a citizen of Missouri for five years.

Accounts from Upper California to the 15th of October last have been received by editors of the New York Sun. A British fleet, destined for Oregon, is reported to have passed up the West Coast early in October.—The pioneer ship of the fleet, called the "America," touched at Monterey.

**ENGLISH RAILWAYS.**—The London Times has published a document relative to the railway interest of England, which has excited much interest and a good deal of alarm. The document exhibits the astounding number of 1,263 projected companies, to carry out which will require nearly two thirds of the national debt of England! Even the deposit of ten per cent. will alone absorb £53,136,300. It further appears that there are 47 railways completed, representing a capital of £70,680,887. In the course of construction there are 118 lines of railway, to complete which, even with the Parliamentary power of borrowing one-third on debenture, will absorb £67,359,325; so that the invested capital in railways, leaving entirely out of view the new announcements, is already the enormous sum £113,612,018! But if the old, the new, and the announced undertakings are added together, with the ten per cent. deposit, we have the incredible sum of £649,583,790 required for this branch of trade alone. The world never witnessed such folly, knavery, and madness before. [National Intelligencer.]

**AWFUL EXECUTION.**—We have just conversed with a gentleman who witnessed the execution of the old man BURNETT and wife, at Fayetteville, on Saturday last. They were conveyed to the gallows at half past twelve, and were executed about two o'clock.—The old man uttered not a word after he was put on the platform, and the old woman said only a few words, which were understood to be on religious subjects. She is said to have been much agitated, and was unable to stand alone during the adjustment of the rope. Not a soul went forward to bid them adieu, nor did they

take farewell from each other or of the world.

There were a very large number of persons on the ground, probably between two & three thousand. Our informant states that he saw young Burnett, the son, in prison on the morning of the execution, and that he appeared entirely careless and unconcerned about the destiny of his father and mother.—[Van Buren (Ark.) Whig.]

**WILLIAM SMITH**, formerly a Representative in Congress from the State of Virginia, was on Wednesday last elected Governor of that State for the term of three years, commencing on the 1st day of January next. The election was made by the Legislature, as is the custom in Virginia.

## SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The Report of the Secretary of the Treasury was submitted to the House, on Thursday. He recommended the establishment of the Sub-Treasury system, and the extension of a branch of the mint to New York; the graduation of the price of public lands is proposed, but not the reduction to one dollar an acre, which we find in the message.

He proposes a new tariff system, of which the following is an outline:

1. No more money to be collected than is necessary for the wants of the government, economically administered.
2. That no duty go above the lowest rate which will yield the largest revenue.
2. Discrimination below such rate.
4. The maximum revenue duties to be imposed on luxuries.
5. All minimum and specific duties to be abolished, and ad valorem duties substituted.
6. All duties to be so improved as to operate as equally as possible throughout the Union, discriminating neither for nor against any class or section.

The receipts for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1847, are estimated at \$29,851,254.

The expenditures, for the same time, are estimated at \$25,578,813.

So there will be a balance in the Treasury, June 30th, 1847, of \$4,352,441.

The Secretary in his estimate, has reckoned without his host.—[N. Y. Sat. Emporium.]

**GREAT FIRE IN BOSTON.**—A fire broke out on Friday morning of last week in the large Nail Factory on the Mill Dam, which in a very short time was destroyed. The fire is said to have been caused by the friction of a shaft. The loss of property is very large, reported as high as \$60,000.—There was insurance to the amount of \$34,000. By this calamity upwards of 250 worthy and industrious mechanics and laborers, are thrown out of work.

**A KING REPROVED.**—A king was riding along in disguise, and seeing a soldier at a public door, stopped and asked the soldier to drink with him, and while drinking the king swore.—The soldier said, "I am sorry to hear young gentlemen swear." His Majesty took no notice, but swore again.—The soldier said, "I'll pay part of the pot, if you please, and go, for I so hate swearing that if you were the king him-

self I should tell you of it." "Should you, indeed?" said the king. "Isho'd," said the soldier. The soldier was afterwards ordered into the king's presence while he was dining with some lords. Presently the king uttered an oath; the soldier modestly said, "Sho'd not my lord the king fear an oath?"—The king, looking at the soldier, said "There, my lords, is an honest man; he can respectfully remind me of the sin of swearing, but you can let me stain my soul by swearing, and not so much as tell me of it."
